

CHRIST THE REDEEMER Finance Report for the 2023 AGM

I would like to firstly recognize the very professional group of Church volunteers that I am lucky enough to help guide me through this rookie year as Chairperson of the Finance Committee. We have Denis Perrault as Vice Chair, Shirley Dafoe recording secretary, Duane Ring, Jahnaya Mann, Larry Jensen, Tyler Wallin and of course our Commander and Chief Father Thomas as voting members. We are so lucky to also have Darrell Weber agree to stay on as an advisor and our budget expert.

This Board has been served by a fabulous person and employee as our Administrative Assistant for 22 years by the name of Jackie Hagen. Thanking her just isn't enough as she has guided us through the greatest changes of this parish ever. We know God will reward you for all the love and excellent service you have provided to all the people of our community! God bless you Jackie and we wish you and Gord many happy years of retirement.

Most of you have probably already met her but we are extremely excited to Welcome our new Administrative Assistant, Alleen Barraca to help guide us in the future.

As well I would also like to thank all those that have served us on the past Finance Councils but especially Past Chair Ted Wallin who had and continues to put in hundreds of hours serving our Church Community.

If I may, I will continue with our 2022 Parish Financial results for our operating and building accounts as prepared in our Income Statements and Balance Sheets. I will try to summarize and do some explanations of the numbers and then we will take your questions and with the assistance of your Finance Council proceed to answer them. If we cannot provide the information at this time, we will take the questions down and provide answers in the upcoming weekly bulletins.

Even though our Church attendance has slowly increased this year, possibly due to the Covid situation slowly improving but our weekly Sunday collection hasn't kept pace.

The positive side is we have a tremendous number of automatic debits from you, being made directly to the church for the mortgage payments and also for operations of the facility. And again we sincerely thank everyone of you that have made those automatic commitments to our cash flow. God Bless you all.

To help modernize and simplify the ability to donate to our Church, a couple of our Council members have done some research and will be presenting a few other methods that will become available for donating in the next few months.

Quick Operational Summary

- 1. Our Operating Investments Fund at the end of 2022 consist of \$276,025.
- 2. Value of total assets have gone up approximately \$60,500

Building Fund Balance Sheet

- 1. Revenues (including donations, fundraising, and interest) have increased in comparison to 2021.
- 2. A tremendous job by the fundraising group in which we only had a slight decrease, but they still raised an astounding \$71,842.00. In 2022.

- **3.** Our Inter-Parochial Building deposit fund Investments at the end of 2022 earned. \$27,500 of note we have placed another \$160,000 to our debt as of end of 2022.
- 4. Our original 2016 mortgage was \$3,677,863 thru the generosity of our parishioners and our talented fundraisers we have reduced our long-term debt to \$2,817,863 which until November was at a 3% loan rate.
- 5. Going forward to the 2023 operating budget your finance council has approved a budget of \$360,570.00 the same as last year. Your finance council will work at cost saving and being prudent with our monies. We are always willing to listen to ideas and solutions to our financial needs.

Finance Councils approximate expense by Committee (in Summary)

- 1. Finance The most significant event that took place in the fall of 2022 is the increase in bank interest rates as of November 1st. This of course means for us, like most people with mortgages a shocking increase of 2%. For us it is approximately an extra \$60.000.00 a year which has made us put a slow down on some of the targets that were set at last year's AGM. Spent \$264,496.00
- 2. Adult faith no report
- 3. Deanery Nelson Pompu has kept his committee very busy. Spent \$211.00
- 4. Ecumenism –Val Choo Foo and her committee have had a very active year working with the other Churches. Spent \$411.00
- 1. Liturgy Nicole Francis and team have been extremely busy this year and spent \$14,223.00
- Maintenance Duane Ring and his tremendously skilled and dedicated crew of volunteers have done again a fabulous job fixing and repairing many parts of our building along with snow removal etc. Thanks so much guys. Spent \$61,762.00
- 3. Pastoral Care program limited due to pandemic.
- 4. Social Great work, always by Yvonne Laviolette and team feeding us! Spent \$4616.00
- 5. Social Justice a very busy year, excellent work by Michelle Vallee and Team. Spent \$2879.00
- 6. Stewardship No spending.
- 7. Vocations No spending.
- 8. Welcoming –. Thanks to Mary Tardif and her Welcoming group who continue to look after the needs of our many new parishioners. Spending\$4091.00
- 9. Youth Deloris and Dustin Funk who are continually working hard to reengage our youth programing. Spending \$589.00

In summary I believe we have had a strong year coming off of Covid and with God's Guidance and of course your steady support, we expect another tremendous year in 2023. God Bless you all.

ADULT FAITH FORMATION COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT 2022/23

This is the 4th year for the Adult Faith Formation committee at Christ The Redeemer Parish. Thank you to Judy Friesen who had served as Chair for 3 years but unfortunately for us she has moved away. This is my first year as Chair of our committee. Thank you to the following committee members who continue to share their time and talents with our parish in many ways: Larry Dudragne, Nicole Francis, Michele Merkel, Denise Wallin and Mary Siemens together with the guidance of Fr. Thomas. Thank you also to Judy Knelsen for all her time spent in maintaining our Parish Library. We are grateful for her service and to parishioners who donate spiritual books and resources for our library; which are available on loan to parishioners.

Highlights and projects for the year are as follows:

We were very pleased to have Raymond Martinson receive the Sacraments of Initiation (Eucharist and Confirmation) at the Easter Vigil April 16/22.

We are pleased to have a parishioner preparing to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. Thank you to Deacon David Hagel and Leah (MacDonald) Perrault for leading our study sessions.

Eucharist Adoration continues to be held the 1st Friday of the month, following morning Mass. A 30 minute Praise, Prayer, Worship and Petition service is held as a complement to the existing Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. Parishioners are invited to place their prayer requests in the box in the south foyer. Parishioners are also invited to sign up to spend an hour with Jesus and the Blessed Sacrament between 10am and 3 pm. There is a Divine Mercy Holy Hour from 3 to 4pm.

Adult Faith Formation hosted a Zoom Rosary until March 2022 at which time we began praying the Rosary in the public square north of City Hall, Chaplin St. East; every Wednesday at 6pm. Parishioners are invited to come pray for our country and our many needs.

Fr. Chris Juchacz led a Men's book study each Monday during Lent 2022 with good participation.

Deacon Lamont Dyck led our Lenten Retreat: Drawing Closer to Jesus and the Love of God and Divine Mercy on Mar 30 & 31. Sessions were well attended with positive feedback.

Mary Siemens led 2-6 week CCO Source Study groups on the Holy Spirit and how to strengthen our faith with the help of the Holy Spirit. Michele Merkel is now leading a 6 week CCO Growth Study group which is helping parishioners grow and strengthen their faith through the Sacraments.

During the month of June short Eucharistic Miracle videos were presented before every weekend Mass to show parishioners the real presence of Jesus in the consecrated Host.

On October 15th with the help of the CWL we hosted the Canada Needs Our Lady Rosary Rally beside our church.

Our parish <u>formed.org</u> subscription was renewed for 2023. A big thank you to all who contributed to make this possible. We encourage parishioners to take advantage of this free access to a wide variety Catholic movies, Bible studies and resources for all ages.

Leah (Macdonald) Perrault led our Advent Retreat on Dec. 6&7: "Give Me Jesus" with much sharing of how to prepare for and welcome Jesus into our lives through all seasons of life and how to receive his many varied gifts that come to us in many forms. Sessions were well attended with excellent feedback from parishioners.

During the month of December slides were shown before weekend Masses explaining various meanings of Christmas Traditions.

A wall display has been put up near the south foyer doors with many different prayer cards, pamphlets and brochures; as well there is a display in the north foyer and the media stand for parishioners to take throughout the year and share with others as a means of evangelization.

During the Advent and Lenten seasons we provide many recourses to guide parishioners with display tables in the south foyer. A basket is provided for donations. Brochures and prayer cards were placed in church pews at various times throughput the year for parishioner.

- -Revisit of Faith Sharing Day with Archbishop Don in March of 2020. Those present at the visit felt it was very uplifting and encouraging, for themselves and the Bishop, and the idea to have the Bishop return in the fall was adopted.
- -A Synod update was tabled, some participants unsure of what to do. Father Melchore did a wonderful job explaining the questions the church has of us.
- -Comments were given on revision of by-laws for parish and finance councils.
- -Closing Prayer by Deacon Dave.

Lunch and coffee were provided.

Meeting of June 22, 2022 at the home of Nelson and Theresa Pompu, Swift Current.

- -The meeting started with a barbeque.
- -Deacon Dave opened the meeting with a song of praise.
- -Notice of Archbishop Don's visit to the Deanery, Sat. Oct. 22,2022.
- -Itinerary of the day was presented and discussed.

Meeting of October 22, 2022 Christ the Redeemer Church, Swift Current

- -The day began with a Mass, and the Priests and the Deacon of the Deanery were in attendance.

- -There was much discussion on the makeup of Councils, especially as it refers to rural Parishes with small attendance. The chairs informed all present that the Archdiocese is pleased to work on an individual bases with these Parishes to meet the guidelines.

This report covers participation of Christ the Redeemer Catholic Church in ecumenical events as part of the Swift Current and Area Ministerial Association (SCAMA) initiatives in our community.

- I attend monthly SCAMA meetings
- I planned and led a few Interdenominational worship services at some of the seniors' homes – The Meadows, Riverview Village Estates, Pioneer Manor, Cypress House, The Bentley and Willow Creek Manor. Thanks to the special group of parishioners who helped with these services – reading prayers and scriptures as well as leading the music ministry. I also oversee the scheduling of the eleven participating churches and the six seniors' facilities for the ten months of the year when we hold these Interdenominational worship services. The residents really enjoy these special services.
- Last year Christ the Redeemer church hosted the Stations of the Cross and invited other churches to participate in the different readings at each station. We were hoping to hold this event outdoors, but the weather was not favorable, so we held it indoors. It was a very special coming together of different churches to celebrate the powerful and touching Stations of the Cross.
- The Interdenominational Lenten services were held at East Side of God.
 Father Thomas, Deacon Dave, and some of the parishioners from Christ the Redeemer church lead one of the Lenten services.
- Christ the Redeemer church was involved in the reader exchange during the first Sunday of Advent.
- The beautiful and touching Blue Christmas service was held in person at Eastside Church of God on Dec. 21. Michele Vallee read a scripture at this service.
- One of the very important services that is provided and supported by SCAMA is the Chaplaincy program which is led by Bob Cappelle. He provides spiritual care and support to many patients and residents at both the hospital and The Meadows. Though we have people in our own parish as well as our priests who are responsible for the chaplaincy duties for patients who are Catholic, Bob also visits our parishioners if they want him to. May we support this very important and needed service through financial support, but also through prayer.

Liturgy Committee 2022 Annual Report

Mission statement: The members of the Liturgy Committee are committed to promoting full, conscious and active participation of our parish family in the liturgy through catechesis. We strive to provide meaningful, dignified and life-giving celebrations for the glory of God and the sanctification of His people.

In 2022, the PPC committees again helped to lead the rosary before the weekend Masses and to lead the Stations of the Cross on Fridays during Lent. We were not able to hold our Stations of the Cross outside on Good Friday due to weather, but the Swift Current churches that attended were thankful to be involved in honouring the Lord's Passion with us. We continue to host Adoration on Thursday evenings, First Fridays, Holy Thursday, and Divine Mercy Sunday.

We held a special Mass in June to celebrate with our high school graduates. We also celebrated the Mass for the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed where we prayed for our deceased parishioners and family members. We held the Simbang Gabi Mass Novena again this Advent which was very well attended. Several groups and parishioners helped the Filipino community host the social and refreshments every evening.

We thank you, our parishioners and volunteers, for your dedication to the Holy Mass which is evident in the contributions of time and talent on our committees and the attendance at our liturgical events and Masses.

Sub-committee Reports

Altar Servers - Peggy Marshall and Jennifer Dickson

There was a refresher training session in the spring as the altar servers began to be more involved in Mass again. We now have 3 servers scheduled for every Mass. Father Thomas installed the altar servers in October. There was great participation of servers during the Simbang Gabi novena. Thank you to all our faithful servers who assist at weekend Masses, funerals, and special events.

Audio Visual (A/V) – Laurent Dudragne, Kelsey Fischer

The A/V group has been running smoothly with a great group of dedicated people. Equipment has been installed and updated so that we can project baptisms and live-stream into St. Michael's hall, which we did for Christmas Eve overflow. The team of slide makers have been flexible with the changing requests and the busy liturgical seasons where many Power Points are needed.

Children's Liturgy – Jacqueline Siemens

This ministry began last May and June for the first time since 2020. Thank you to the 6 adults and the youth who helped lead the children during those two months at both 5pm and 10am masses. After a break for the summer, the Children's Liturgy program resumed in September. Fifteen adults, along with several youth, have volunteered to help with this ministry. Thank you so much! You are all appreciated! On average, there are approximately 10-15 children attending Children's Liturgy during the 5pm mass and 20+ at the 10am mass. This past Christmas season, food and toys were purchased for the parish food hampers from coins the children brought forward at mass during collection time. Thank you for your generosity. We are so blessed with our eager children and wonderful leaders!

Décor - Nicole Francis

The décor team is committed to creating a worship space that gives glory to God for each of the liturgical seasons. We maintain the plants throughout the building and also decorate the church, hall and foyers to reflect the changes in the church year, especially during Advent & Christmas and Lent into Easter. The 3H crew was invaluable in assisting us with the Christmas trees and setting up the outdoor nativity. The CWL were also a great help with getting St. Michael's hall ready in December for the many events that were held there. Flowers for Christmas and Easter were again generously donated by our parishioners.

Eucharistic ministers, Lectors, Coordinators, Scheduler – chairs open

Our lectors and other ministers have been faithfully punctual and this has made the coordinator position much easier. Eucharistic ministers were installed in June and December. Several All Saints Catholic School staff were installed as Eucharistic ministers to assist Father Thomas at school Masses.

A big thank you goes out to everyone who has volunteered for this ministry. There are 27 people volunteering for this, and each one is appreciated for their time and efforts!

There are five choirs that are scheduled every month: Contemporary, Mixed, CWL, Simbang Gabi, and the Youth band. For special Masses during the year, we have been encouraging all the members to participate in a large combined choir.

This year there are 60 students preparing for the Sacraments of Reconciliation, Confirmation and First Holy Communion, led by Father Thomas and 3 volunteer Sacrament Pastoral Assistants. They are using the *Together in Jesus* program for the majority of the students. The older students are using the *Signs of Grace* program. Both are being supplemented with a program developed by a family from Regina's Holy Family parish.

Sacristans – Judy Knelsen, Denise Wallin

The sacristan team continues to care for the altar, the votive candles, and the laundering of linens and vestments used at Mass.

Social Justice Ministry Report for 2022 Christ the Redeemer Parish AGM March 19, 2023

The Social Justice committee is a small but active group that promotes and organizes activities, information and assistance with the generous support of our parishioners. In 2022 we were able to resume some of the things that had been put on hold during the height of the pandemic – following are some highlights:

- Food hampers were packed and delivered at Easter and Christmas to many families in our community. Donations of time, money and goods came from parishioners, K of C and All Saints School staff and students.
- > The World Mission Sunday collection in October received \$1180 from parishioners, which was forwarded to Catholic Mission Societies for the Propagation of the Faith.
- ➤ We were able to host an in-person Development and Peach workshop in the fall to learn more about the 'People and Planet First' campaign supporting land defenders in the Global South. Parishioners responded to this campaign throughout the year by listening, donating and signing a petition which called on the federal government to enact human rights and environmental due diligence legislation.
- Important days in spring and fall for Truth and Reconciliation were highlighted and community events promoted. "Itwewin Corner' was periodically included in the bulletin with information from Fr. John Weckend of the Truth and Reconciliation Healing Committee.
- Monthly Senior Card Social afternoons resumed with good attendance, lively card games, food and lots of visiting.
- ➤ The SJ committee was able to co-ordinate two projects with support from parishioners: Trauma Kits for Ukraine and a Salvation Army Meal Team.
- A set of guidelines was developed for supporting those who occasionally come to the parish with emergent needs. In 2022 we were able to assist with things such as food, temporary lodging, gas money and rides.

Thank you to Father Thomas, staff and parishioners for offering their time, talent, treasure and prayers in support of Social Justice needs in our parish and beyond.

The division was formerly established in 2003 after three school boards amalgamated.

HTCSD serves 2323 students and 310 staff members. The division is governed by a six-member board that includes four trustees from Moose Jaw, one from Shaunavon and one from Swift Current.

Joann Blazieko (Moose Jaw) is the board chairperson. Christine Boychuk (Moose Jaw) is the vice-chairperson and a director with the Saskatchewan Catholic School Boards Association (SCSBA).

Other board members include Alison Bradish (Moose Jaw), Derek Hassen (Moose Jaw), Stephanie Nelson (Shaunavon) and Ted Wallin (Swift Current).

There is a board representative for each parish in our communities. The Division employs a part-time religious consultant, Jodie Bzdel who is also a member of St. Joseph's Parish Pastoral Council.

All Saints Catholic has a Pre-K to grade 8 enrollment of 500 students with a staff of 57 (this includes teaching, support and maintenance staff) for the 2022/2023 School Year. We were very pleased to have Casey Yeomans in the Vice-Principal role this year. He and Jelienne Unger are the Faith Leaders at our school and have done a wonderful job.

Each year the school sets learning goals and a belonging goal. The learning goals are based on data gathered through provincial assessments and data gathered from a provincial assessment called 'Our School Survey'. This school year our goals are:

- By June 2023, 80% of students in grade 2-8 will maintain current grade level in Math.
- By June 2023, 80% of students in grades 1-5 will be reading at level. It is with great sense of accomplishment that ASC students have exceeded this benchmark and are well above the provincial average in reading!
- By June 2023, 85% of PreK to grade 8 students will feel confident and comfortable about their learning, behaviour, social interactions and choices at school.

All Saints Catholic students are actively involved in our community. As part of the religion course students in upper grades are asked to give back to the community by actively take part in various activities for 'Service Hours". It is a positive way to learn about the social teachings of our church and the value in being actively involved. As well, the school has several masses each year and two of them are held at Christ the Redeemer. For the other masses, Father comes to the school and these are held in the gym. It is nice to be able to pray together again as a school community.

All Saints continues to be Coffee Hosts and is always open to finding other ways to build that bridge between church and school. It is a rewarding relationship to have with our parish and we look forward to strengthening it.

All Saints is a blessed to be able to not only practice but also share our faith and belong to an active community sharing the Word of God.
